


2011 Refugee Conference







14-17 June 2011 I University of New South Wales I Kensington Campus, Sydney Australia

2011 marks the 60th anniversary of the 1951 Refugee Convention and the 50th anniversary of the 1961 Convention on the Reduction of Statelessness. These conventions were milestones in the recognition of the rights of people displaced by persecution and in the development of an international human rights framework. To mark the anniversary the UNSW Centre for Refugee Research and key refugee advocates and practitioners have partnered to facilitate this conference with a national and international focus. The conference will provide a timely opportunity to reflect on the strengths and achievements of the Refugee Convention and refugee protection system, and to consider what further action is needed to secure the rights of refugees during flight, in countries of asylum and in resettlement.

The four day program will include **plenary sessions and workshops**, as well as a series of dialogues with a strong focus on the Asia Pacific region. The dialogues will include a **youth forum** and **academics and practitioners workshop**, as well as a much anticipated **women's dialogue**. Participants will be invited to engage in these events and debates as a means to showcase good practice and inform the national and international policy frameworks over the coming decade.

Women's Dialogue

The Women's Dialogue will present the views of resettled refugee women nationally and internationally.

The Women's Dialogue will be an adjunct to the seven international Women's Dialogues that are providing a report on refugee women and pledges for refugee protection leading into the UNHCR December 2011 commemoration events.

Youth Forum
